

art in brief

In this space we take a look at notable art exhibitions and special events in New York.

Ricco/Maresca Although celebrated for his achievements in photography, Frederick Sommer worked in a variety of media to encompass drawing, painting, photography, collage, and writing. It was this holistic view of the world that ultimately materialized in his works. This one person exhibition. Visual Affinities. presents a selection of work that reflects the variety of expression in the artist's practice: from photography, ink on paper and "glue color" drawings (pigment suspended in hide alue), to his "musical score" works, 10/27 thru 11/27

Kate Oh Gallery Although her work is abstract, Hosook Kang explores the intricacies and spiritual resonances of the natural world in her colorful and highly detailed paintings in this one person show. Kang's handling of paint, though evocative of pointilism, bridges traditions as varied as postwar abstraction and Japanese landscape painting, distilling the mysteries of the natural world into constellations of painted dots. Ki Smith Gallery "I want to communicate the feeling that occurs when a moment stretches out or condenses, in which you feel outside yourself." This thought, spelled crisply on the display wall of Ki Smith Gallery facing the street, compelled me to go into the gallery and view the work of Dylan Reitz, the artist who chose/wrote the quote.

A moment stretched or condensed evolves into a moment that stands by itself, allowing a sweeping perspective into the moment. In meticulously crafted compositions, Reitz utilizes hand made paper to comment on cyclical movements of nature, such as the tidal waves, the dance of anemone tentacles, and glacial eruptions or erosions. In these stylized, quiet abstractions of physical phenomena,

color is subdued, varying in tones of egg shell and parchment white. This monochromatic choice creates a neutral tone for the work to exist in, prolonging the aujet unique to the works.

Each work is animated by a QR code, allowing it to exist digitally beyond the duration of the show. The animations undulate vertically or horizontally to capture the moment, further adding to the extended/contracted action. Perhaps the most sustained example is a sequence involving three organic shapes reminiscent of banana peels — or the anemone nubs — manipulated deftly like a pair of clock hands in an improvised dance. The piece, Tic Toc (or Paper Nubs), follows the rules of its own airtight logic, as one clicks clockwise and the other follows. As accessible as these images appear, they're also mysterious. By lingering on what seems to be the particular in the larger picture, Reitz allows the viewer to encounter the metaphysical: the cyclical presence inherent to all details of planet earth. The expanded moment delivers, even in its condensed form; or vice versa (See listing).

Gallery Closes

Pace Gallery Beijing has closed its 22,000 square-foot space in the 798 Art District in Beijing. Founder, Arne Glimcher, told ARTnews "It's impossible to do business in mainland China right now and it has been for awhile." Back in the heady days of 2008, when the country's communist dictatorship appeared open to reform, in its public relations blitz to host the 2008 Summer Olympics, Pace was the first major U.S. contemporary art gallery to pin its hopes on doing business with Communist China.

New Gallery

Stone Sparrow NYC has launched a new ground floor gallery in the West Village at 45 Greenwich Ave.(See listing)



velcome to the M magazine and its companion guide, the M art map. I say magazine, because we have begun to include more and more editorial content from the M magazine, which is published quarterly as a premium quality print journal, in the foldout pages of the M art map. The new art in brief section, for example, is actually a magazine feature that we have carried over into the foldout here, in excerpted form without the images.

Through interviews with artists, curators, collectors, and excellent writing in the magazine, combined with our select list of premium galleries here, M brings you the art world writ large: inthe Artworld.

About our editorial policy: When an article appears in the art in brief section, it may be a preview of an upcoming show that we recommend, in which case there will be dates at the end. It may be a review of a show that is currently on view, or a review of a show that recently finished, whereby the work may be represented by a gallery that we list. In the latter case, no dates appear, since the gallery contact can be found in the same edition, under premium galleries.

Some articles are written by our writers, whose names appear in the byline at the end. When there is no byline, that means the article was written or edited by our staff or multiple outside sources.

Sometimes we may include an image with a gallery listing. These are not ads, rather they appear on an editorial basis like the articles. Our editorial content, whether in the form of writing or images is never for sale.

You may notice something new on the cover of this issue. For a long time, I insisted the cover remain blank, in keeping with our signature clean design. Then I had the idea to introduce very short, haiku inspired aphorisms that can inform daily life, much like the often eerily prescient message found inside a fortune cookie. Čarrying this idea forward, in this issue I decided to put a random selection of real fortune cookie messages on the cover. We print 15,000 copies of each issue, delivered to hundreds of galleries, art venues, top hotels and VIP events all over New York, That's a lot of fortunes to be told.
